Overview

The Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies Program offers a rare professional development opportunity for midcareer professionals in fields related to conflict resolution and peacebuilding. Up to 30 participants from around the world participate in an intensive three-month course at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand. Led by experts in the field, the program balances theoretical and practical learning while capitalizing on the diverse experiences of both lecturers and participants.

Ideal for busy professionals, the Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies Program's customized curriculum helps promising leaders expand their global outlook, strengthen their negotiation skills, and ultimately make a positive impact on future peace and conflict resolution efforts worldwide.

Basic Eligibility Requirements

Candidates must meet the following criteria:

- Be currently employed fulltime in a mid- to upper-level position in conflict negotiation, peacebuilding, or a related field
- Have at least five years of work experience
- Be proficient in English
- Hold a bachelor's degree or the equivalent

Location

Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, is the host for the Rotary Center for Peace and Conflict Studies. The oldest university in Thailand and ranked one of the top universities in Asia, it sits on 212 hectares (523 acres) of land in the heart of central Bangkok, surrounded by historical sites and modern cultural points of interest. The university was founded

in 1917 by H.M. King Vajiravudh and was named Chulalongkorn in honor of King Rama V, who established a nationwide education system open to all citizens.

Alumni

Program alumni work in a variety of key positions for governments, UN agencies, and nongovernmental organizations. Their efforts to resolve conflict and build and maintain peace prove daily the lasting value of their program experiences. Graduates of the program also enjoy the support of a growing worldwide network of fellow alumni committed to building peace.





Curriculum

Designed and taught by specialists from around the world, the intensive curriculum enables program participants to identify and understand the causes of conflict at the local, regional, and international levels. The coursework is designed to foster participants' skills in conflict prevention and resolution, with a focus on effecting change and maintaining peace. The theoretical components of the program curriculum address the following four themes, each with a set of related subtopics. Case and field studies embedded within the curriculum provide valuable practical application of classroom discussions.

Module I: The Concepts and Values of Peace and Conflict Studies

Topics include:

- Conflict resolution: the state of the art
- Nature, types, and root causes of conflict
- Global overview of conflict situations

Module II: The Diagnosis and Analysis of Conflict

Topics include:

- Conflict mapping
- Conflict impact assessment
- Resource-based conflict

Module III: Conflict Resolution Skills, Approaches, and Strategies

Topics include:

- Hot-spot mapping
- Civil society and conflict resolution

Program Cost

Costs for tuition, room and board (housing option only), educational materials, insurance, field study costs, and other expenses are:

Housing option: THB200,000

No housing option: THB104,000

Program Funding

In view of the benefits derived from employing highly trained professionals, participants’ employers are asked to cover as much of the program cost as possible. Fellowships are available from The Rotary Foundation for individuals whose employers are unable to pay the full cost. All applicants not fully funded by their employers are automatically considered for a fellowship. There is no scenario by which an applicant would be selected for the program and not awarded fellowship funds if needed.

The program also seeks fellowship sponsor partnerships from organizations committed to building peace. The cost of sponsoring a single fellowship represents a rather modest investment, but one that can yield spectacular results when participants from conflict areas return home better prepared to work for peace.
